This year Marty Johnson will be offering monthly canning workshops at the Caspar Community Center. The first one will be held on Sunday, April 13th, from 10-2. These workshop offer a hands on experience with the different ways of preserving local food. (Pressure canner, water bath, refrigerator pickles and fermented foods) In April Marty is going to focus on what one would preserve in late winter and early spring... Black bean soup, canned beans, vegetable stock, possibly a root vegetable salsa. Because she also has frozen peaches from last year and part of spring cleaning is clearing out fruits from the prior year, we will make a wonderful peach chutney. Fermented foods are part of every workshop and we will start with a simple sauerkraut. Spices are an important part of creating delicious canning flavor so in April we will make our own spice mixtures for the coming year (pickling spice, curry spice, garum masala). One of the most important aspects this workshop is re-creating the community feeling that was part of rural life as people came together to put up the summer abundance. The cost of the workshop is \$20 and you are asked to bring a good knife, cutting board, apron, and vegetable peeler. Marty will provide all the ingredients and supplies. # WATER!

Our recent survey showed that 20% of respondents in Caspar experienced issues with water supply during this past year. All of our households rely on groundwater pumping from wells to water our gardens, bathe, do our dishes and wash our clothes. We all share the aquifer with our neighbors. Using water responsibly in this time of drought will help you and your neighbors adjust to what is an indeterminate long term drought condition.

- Onsite water storage can make a significant impact on your home's water availability by providing a much needed buffer for a well whose on-demand production has slowed.
- Conserve, conserve, conserve. Flush less, shower for shorter periods and perhaps less often. Make an effort to not soil your clothes. Keep a pair of gardening overalls that can stay mildly soiled and wash only when necessary. Use drip irrigation for your garden. Be vigilant in monitoring your water systems usage and repair leaks and malfunctions upon discovery. Reconsider your need to run the hot water tap until the water comes out hot; many simple cleaning uses do not require hot water. Wash your car someplace else :).
- Maintain an ongoing dialogue with your close neighbors as to their water situation. We're **all in this drought together** and many survey respondents replied that they would share their water resources with others.
- Consider a rainfall catchment system for your garden needs. When (and if) it does rain significant water can be harvested from your house roof and other structures. Bladder storage units can even be located under decks. Rainwater due to its' low salinity/balanced pH is actually better for your garden plants than well water.

At the Caspar Community Center we're working on getting the old well back in production, incorporating it into the storage tank, and using it as an irrigation source for the garden.

Longer term plans look to expanding use of the Caspar Cattle Company wells to serve a larger portion of the community. - Bob Freu

# Emergency Preparedness

Caspar's new Emergency Preparedness Working Group has not met yet, but efforts have gone forward to further establish Caspar Community Center as a shelter in event of a disaster. The initial application document is being updated, and contact has been made with County Emergency Services, and Health and Human Services to learn ways of acquiring and storing supplies for community disaster preparedness. The Caspar Commons web site now includes the **"Escape Map"** for exiting Caspar in event bridges are down, and improved information, including phone numbers and actions to be taken in event of disaster are being prepared for the website. Other small communities have been able to obtain grant funds for preparedness, and this item will be explored. ### Rubber Boots Weather

Spring rains have blessed us and the garden is soaking wet. Fortunately the water will recede in a few days and we can start planting again. The garden is beautifully blooming with kale flowers, calendula, and honeywort. On a warm day you can hear the bees buzzing around the giant flowering cabbages. The slugs and snails are out

and about of course, and also the diabolical beetles (Diabrotica undecimpunctata). These greenish yellow bugs are also known as spotted cucumber beetles. They chew holes in the leaves of many different crops and seem especially fond of my spinach and chard. In their larval form they tunnel through the roots of young plants stunting or killing them! Unfortunately I am not aware of any organic controls for this pest. If you have any tricks please let me know! The next garden workshop will be Sunday April 27th after Breakfast at 11:00. We
